# **Togetherness**

How can I paint the happiness of a marriage that the church cements? ... Two believers sharing one hope, one rule of life and one service! - Light Turquoise (pigeon): talkative ("You cannot keep a secret")

- Pink (poor one): abject poverty ("I doubt you will afford to pay the bride price"; "you are not providing sufficient for me" - Western paraphrase)
- Purple: friendship ("You have become my new friend")
- Brown (soil): life ("My love is like the earth which gives rise to new life")
- Striped beads (grasshopper): doubt, fickleness, two-timing ("You are like a grasshopper springing from bush to bush")
